
WE CAN MAKE IT HAPPEN—THE BANK OF NEWCHURCH IS OPEN AGAIN!

YEAR 5 MAKE IT HAPPEN AT THE YACHT CLUB!

At Newchurch we make it our mission possible to give as many water-based experiences as possible as we know it is important that the children grow up with respect for the sea and a good knowledge of sea safety. On Tuesday, our first group of children from Year 5 attended their first sailing session at Seaview Yacht Club. The children were excited to get stuck in. There was a strong onshore wind which meant that sailing would be difficult, but the children had lots of theory to learn before getting onto the sea so they spent time getting to know their instructors and learning all about sailing.

After challenge 1, getting into wetsuits, the children were split into smaller groups of 5. In these groups, they were shown the different parts of the boats and what they need to do to get their boat ready for sailing. Once they were confident on this, they learnt how to steer the boat and how to turn the boat around, called a 'tack'. The children worked in pairs, one in charge of

steering and the other a crew member to ensure it was safe to turn. Everyone picked this up quickly and the instructors were impressed by their knowledge. At the end, the children had a chance to have a splash around in the sea, Miss Bartlett thinks it's fair to say they were shocked by how cold it was but this didn't stop some of them from fully submerging themselves!

We're all looking forward to going back next week.









KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE—WHY LANGUAGE MATTERS.

During the Easter break the NSPCC published a blog looking at why it's important to explore what young people mean when they talk about 'friends' they've made online. This topic seems very relevant considering that also during the holiday WhatsApp reduced their age limit from 16 to 13 years old.

Friendships are an important part of life for any child, allowing them to feel connected, understood, and cared for but children are placing increasing value on the internet as a place to form and maintain friendships. However, meeting and connecting with others online also comes with risks, including potential grooming and online abuse.

The blog shares that children sometimes refer to individuals they've met online as their friends but often when digging a little deeper, it becomes clear that the child knows very little about this person and that in some cases the person is a risk to the child.

It is therefore essential for parents to remain curious when discussing children's online relationships and to consider whether the term 'friend' could be masking safeguarding concerns.

Whether offline, online or a mixture of the two, forming a 'friendship' with a child is a common grooming technique used by those seeking to abuse or exploit children. Groomers often aim to befriend and gain the trust of children by:

- pretending to be someone they're not, for example by saying they are the same age as the child online
- offering advice or understanding
- buying gifts, including virtual gifts which can be harder to spot
- giving the child attention.

The NSPCC have highlighted how children may feel more confident talking to other children and adults online than they would offline and be less aware of the potential risks.

This can leave children increasingly vulnerable to online grooming practices aimed at making children believe that online groomers really are their friends.

Key points to take away

- Children sometimes refer to people they meet online as their 'friends,' even though they know little about these people or the potential or actual risk they pose.
- Groomers often seek to befriend and gain the trust of children online as part of the grooming process.
- When a child or young person describes someone who they met online as their 'friend,' dig a little deeper into the dynamic of the relationship.

If parents take a child's word that the person they've met online is their 'friend' without questioning the nature and dynamic of the relationship, this may lead to the signs of grooming being missed.

Take note of the language that your child uses and be sure that when using the word 'friend' they are really talking about someone that they know.

We have had cause to remind Year 5 & 6 about respectful online behaviours this week and Miss Howarth and Mrs Parkin reminded the classes in assembly on Wednesday that Whatsapp has an age limit for a reason and that all messages leave a digital footprint. Children were reminded to make healthy choices to think carefully about the content that they send in messages and advised not to share numbers or add to chat groups without permission.

If you have any concerns about your child's online behaviours please do make contact with staff at school who will be able to assist you further with help and advice.

SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?



We are super proud of Pennu Class this week! They have had a fantastic first week back at school and have certainly impressed us with their handwriting and spelling during our phonics sessions. We are learning to read phase 4 end blends st, mp and ft and have been great at spotting them in words. In maths we have been teaching Marvin the maths monkey how to count larger collections of things. We taught him to put things in a line or move them to make counting easier and more accurate. In provision, we have been busy planting out our beanstalks and we were very excited to meet our new class pets ... 5 tiny caterpillars. We are excited to watch them grow.

What a fantastic first week of the summer term! This week in English the children have been exploring and reading through our new book 'Emma Janes aeroplane', it has been wonderful to see the children make so many meaningful links to their learning in Science and Geography throughout the book. In Science this week we have learnt all about carnivores, omnivores, and herbivores and sorted a range of animals into the correct dietary group. In phonics this week we have been busy recapping over our learnt diagraphs, trigraphs, quadgraphs and split diagraphs, all the children are working incredibly hard with their recognition and blending, keep up the good work!



Yr 4

Shilling class have hit the ground running this half term. We have been enjoying our new rich text, 'The Night Gardener'. The children made some super predictions about what they thought the book would be about using a picture from the start of the book and comparing it to a picture at the end of the book. They were then shown the front cover and had to think about whether the title of the story would change their prediction. They have been working very hard on using dictionaries and thesauruses to find new and unknown words. They are brilliant at looking for and thinking of synonyms for these new words too! In Maths we have been looking at length and

height. We have been predicting lengths, measuring, comparing and ordering. In Geography we have started to look at the seven countries in the Arctic Circle. In Art we have started to look at work by Henri Rousseau. We have discussed which pieces of aspects of his work we like or dislike and why as well as finding out lots of facts about the artist. In PSHE we have started to look at different ways in which we can encourage ourselves to do better and try our best- something which this class are absolutely super at! Well done Year 2:) Yr 3

This week in Real Class we have started to look at our new book Tuesday. We have been creating wanted posters for the frogs in the story. In Maths we are continuing our work on measuring using metres, centimetres and millimetres. In Science we have completed an assessment on our

> learning for States of Matter last term and started talking about our new topic Plants and how they make their food. In PSHE this term we will be looking at being the best we can be. We started this week with healthy eating and the benefits both physically and mentally.

Year 4 have had a great first week back. We have started our new English text, The Dot by Peter H Reynolds, and have been looking at different ways anger is expressed in literature. After exploring a few different texts, we created our own 'anger bank' and used this to help us write our own poems. In maths, we have been looking at mixed numbers and improper fractions and how to convert between the two. We started our new geography topic by locating some of the different counties of England on a map. We also talked about the county towns and found out which county the Isle of Wight belongs to and what our county town is (see if your children can remember!) In science, we learned about the reproductive parts of a flower and dissected some flowers to identify the parts.

Yr 5 Krone Class had their first sailing lessons at Seaview Yacht Club this week. They learnt about the boats and how to sail them this week and even had time to have a dip in the sea! Very brave! In maths, we have been looking at calculating the perimeter of 2d shapes, particularly squares and rectangles, using their properties to help us add up all the sides. In English, we have started our new rich text 'The Wonder Garden', a non-fiction book about the different wonders of the world. The book is unique in the way it is written, using descriptions and facts to take you on a journey through the wonderful landscapes. We have also been busy making Anglo-Saxon houses and broaches to show what daily life was like. This will help us contrast life from the Anglo-Saxon times compared to the Vikings. The class also enjoyed starting our new project in art, Street art. This week we looked at graffiti and designed our own unique throw-ups.



This week, Year 6 have started their new learning journey in English - looking at the book "Moth". The class really enjoyed reading this text and made cross curricular links to their science topic from last half term on evolution. They have created some excellent setting descriptions using contrasting images in the text which we very much enjoyed reading. We had an exciting start to our new Science topic (sound) this week too by making some musical instruments. The children were tasked with making two instruments which produce two different pitches and volumes of sound. They came up with some incredible and unique instruments in their groups.
